Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

Although its hard to believe, our Summer Seminarian Hiep ends his time with us next weekend. He arrived back in May and now he has one week left. The ten weeks have flown by, but it has been a joy to have Hiep with us here at OLM.

After finishing next weekend, Hiep will be traveling home to Vietnam with two classmates from St. John Seminary. It will be their first visit to Vietnam, but Hiep returns home to visit his sister and her family and his older brother who is a Pastor there.

We are grateful for Hiep's presence and ministry among us this summer. He is a very capable young man and will make an outstanding priest. Please pray for him as he continues his studies for the priesthood. Also, join us next Sunday following the 10:30am Mass as we say "Farewell and Thank You Hiep" with a reception in Mercy Park.

Hiep isn't the only one leaving this week! Our good Franciscan Apostolic Sisters, Sister Emma and Sister Lourdes, depart Tuesday for their Annual Retreat in Nebraska. They are taking the Franciscan Sisters from Scalabrini Villa with them. They make their way there via Peoria, Illinois where a few of their sisters serve the Bishop and Cathedral Parish.

They then drive from Peoria to Seward, Nebraska to begin their retreat at St. Gregory the Great Seminary. A good number of the Franciscan Apostolic Sisters serve on the seminary staff there. They host the Annual Retreat and Community meetings every year.

I know the Sisters are praying for us during their time of retreat. So please keep the good Sisters in your prayers for their safe travel, and also for a fruitful retreat. They return to OLM on August 7th, renewed, rested and ready!

In late June I attended a meeting of area priests with Bishop Tobin at St. Bernard's Parish. It was the first of three regional meetings for the Bishop with his priests. It was a time for the Bishop to discuss new initiatives and share ongoing concerns with his priests, and also for the priests to share their thoughts with Bishop Tobin.

It was a positive meeting despite some concerning news about the fiscal stress facing the Diocese. Bishop Tobin also announced that the Diocese of Providence is to launch a capital campaign next year to raise \$50 million. This campaign is to mark the 150th anniversary of the founding of our Diocese in 1872.

The two-year campaign, titled "Grateful for God's Providence" begins in January 2018 at parishes across the Diocese. The much needed campaign seeks to increase resources to stabilize, and also maintain. the viability parish and diocesan funds. The rising costs of the care for priests, elderly seminary education for future priests, Catholic schools, and increasing social services for the poor are the main part of this effort.

Bishop Tobin announced that "the faith and generosity of Catholics in this diocese continues to be remarkable. I am very confident that the campaign

will be successful, and I hope that every member of our church participates in this historic campaign."

Guidance in Giving, a New York-based company that advises Catholic groups on fundraising, is advising the campaign. They have operated similar campaigns across the country including the recent, and very successful, campaign for over \$90 million in the Archdiocese of Newark, NJ.

Without a doubt this is challenging news for every Catholic in Rhode Island who values their faith and their Church. But, it is also a unique opportunity to ensure a firm foundation for the future of the Church's ministry and mission for the next generation of Catholics.

know that our forebears in the faith, those immigrant Catholics who helped found the Diocese of Providence in 1872, also faced many serious challenges. These included religious discrimination, limited resources and strong resistance to the Church's mission. Not much has changed in 150 years, but now its our opportunity to secure a future in faith. I do not know when the campaign begins at OLM, but I will most certainly keep you informed.

Why does the priest kiss the altar?

Every time we attend Mass, we observe everyone genuflecting toward the altar, but priests and deacons kiss the altar. They do so twice: at the end of the entrance procession and at the conclusion of Mass, before processing out. There are several meanings behind

this kissing of the altar by the priest.

The priest kisses the altar in order to show reverence and honor for the altar of sacrifice which represents Christ himself. Because the altar is a sacred place where the miracle of the Eucharist occurs, when the priest or deacon kisses the altar, not only do they show reverence to the altar, but to the person of Christ as well.

Also, when the priest kisses the altar, he reverences the relics of the saint or martyr placed within the altar itself. The relics within the altar must be the first-class relics of saints. This is deeply rooted in ancient Christian tradition.

During the persecution in the first centuries of the Church history in Rome, the Mass had to be celebrated in secret in the underground. Because the Mass is celebrated in the underground, they chose to celebrate Mass on the stone slabs covering the tomb of a martyr to reverence the martyr and their heroic and ultimate sacrifice for the Lord. This is the reason why traditionally the altar has the shape of a tomb.

When the emperor Constantine legalized Christianity early in the fourth century, the celebration of the Mass moved from underground to above ground, from the catacombs to public buildings or churches. Although this transition occurred, the practice and tradition of venerating the martyrs was continued to be an important dimension of the Mass. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal instructs that, "The practice of placing relics of Saints, even those not Martyrs, under the altar to be dedicated is fittingly retained. Care should be taken, however, to ensure the authenticity of such relics." (302)

In conclusion, when a priest kisses the altar, he is reverencing the person of Christ, which the altar represents, and is also, even if they are not present, continuing the ancient tradition of honoring the great and heroic sacrifice of the martyrs. Therefore, whenever we come into the Church, we should show reverence to God by genuflect or bow our head to the tabernacle where Jesus is present and to the altar where the relic of saints and Jesus present.
